Westcott likes to work with prints and scale to trick the eye with textural details. She uses understated tailoring in her collection with well-constructed garments slowly revealing small intricacies.

## Byron McGilvray



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Raffles graduate Byron McGilvray showed designs infused with optical fibres in a structured-yet-soft collection. With a strong micro-mini hemline, hieroglyphic digital prints, layering different weights of silk and leather and exaggerated silhouettes. Colours were low-key and smokey, allowing the pearlescent nature of the optical fibres to shine through. Showing a strong interest in sustainability, the designer uses organic cotton and works to ensure a strong relationship between his garments and the wearers.
